In my first year as Chair of Murray Arts, the organisation was forced once again to navigate through a range of COVID-related challenges. The arts community in our region needed the support and guidance of Murray Arts more than ever.

As we come to terms with a new kind of post-lockdown normal, more things are possible, yet COVID continues to create its own crazy kind of chaos, with high levels of infection circulating and isolation rules resulting in staff shortages and event postponements or cancellations. It's a different kind of hard, but just as hard.

In these troubled times, optimism is our greatest asset, and our organisation provides both comfort and hope to artists who are struggling to pick up the pieces. Murray Arts offers practical help through grant programs like UNLOCKED, platforms to show and sell work, most notably Burraja Gallery online, and forums for ideas and information sharing including the Cultural Roundtable.

Many in the cultural community have felt a sense of abandonment during this pandemic, with government solutions either not applying to them or delivering too little too late. Murray Arts has provided – and will continue to provide – support and a sense of community and belonging.

In 2021 we developed a new strategic plan and restructured the executive to better reflect the workload and dynamics of the organisation.

Despite the headwinds, a lot was achieved this year and on behalf of the board I would like to thank Alyce and Susan for their leadership and the whole team for their commitment.








MUSIC MICRO FESTIVAL

LIMELIGHT: ART - SCIENCE - LIGHT!

This event has been in development, since the inaugural Limelight: Art – Science – Light event wowed audiences, in September 2018, with everyone demanding 'when is the next one?'. The Murray Arts team set about dreaming up a way to build on the inaugural offering, be grounded in place, prioritise working with local creatives and find funding to deliver. Originally planned for Saturday 3 October 2020 -Postponed due to COVID Restrictions and the Border Closure. Rescheduled for Saturday 2 October 202 – Postponed due to COVID Restrictions/Limitations and Weather. Rescheduled for April 2022 (fingers crossed). Project Managers Helen Newman and Bek Gibbs. Artists: Adam Boon, BNG Learning, CAD Factory, Michael Laubli, NOMAD films, Greg Pritchard, and Kurt Saggers. A significant amount of planning has gone into this event, so many variations mapped out and sheer tenacity from the team. Funding has been secured from the Regional Arts Fund and extra funds from Create NSW Restart program have been vital to keep this dream alive.

BURRAJA GALLERY

Burraja Gallery is the only dedicated local Aboriginal Art gallery in the border region. We advocate for all First Nation artists who live, work or connect locally, and provide an opportunity for dialogue and connection between the wider community and our Aboriginal community. Originally situated in the shop front of the old Murray Arts office at Gateway Village, Wodonga, in 2021 we set about trying to find a new space for the gallery. Thanks to the Create NSW Arts Restart program we took advantage of the opportunity for Burraja Gallery to have an Albury CBD Pop-Up. The Pop-Up space at 560 Olive Street Albury, in the stunning Abikhair building, was only meant to be 3-6 months maximum, a case study to see if a more permanent Albury CBD location could be part of the future vision. We managed to extend the Pop-Up to 12months and made so many amazing connections. It was a mammoth undertaking for our small team, ever evolving COVID restrictions and Border closures were so challenging but despite it all we achieved a few exhibitions, workshops, performances and definitely increased the number of sales for our artists. Friday 26 March 2021 - Burraja Gallery Pop-Up, at 560 Olive Street, Albury, Opened. Saturday 12 February 2022 - Burraja Gallery Pop-Up, at 560 Olive Street, Albury, Closed. We are working closely with the community to identify a sustainable & independent future model for Burraja Gallery. You can read the notes from the initial report by Mary-Anne Scully.



WELL MEANING

In the midst of 2020/21 and a pandemic, local First Nations writers came together, at Burraja Gallery, to create. Inspired by the 2019 artwork "Well Meaning' writers were asked to reflect on good intentions and from this provocation emerged a diverse collection of works, from poetry to a script about vengeful Aboriginal vampires. Meeting every second Wednesday, the group engaged in an iterative writing process which saw the project divest from a singular output to four separate works. Each work is in its infancy, this opportunity has allowed creative processes to flourish & encouraged each First Nation writer to create in a world which had all but stood still.

WRITING HUB - PARTNERSHIP WITH MAMA

DIWIL, an immersive installation by the internationally acclaimed interdisciplinary artist and scholar, Brook Garru Andrew featured at MAMA from 12 March to 4 October 2021. The Wiradjuri word diwil translates to 'collection' and reflects on the artist's relationship with objects, history, and Country. Brook Andrew's matrilineal kinship is from the kalar midday (land of the three

rivers) of Wiradjuri, and Ngunnawal on his mother's father's line, both Aboriginal nations of Australia, and paternally Celtic.

The DIWIL Writers Program invited six writers across the opening months of DIWIL to travel to Albury and spend time at the museum, with the artist, with the curatorial team and with the artwork.

Writing can be a solitary practise. This program provided an opportunity for First Nation writers of divergent interests to respond to DIWIL. Each writer was invited to experience DIWIL in person, gather and yarn about concepts and intentions of work, walk on Wiradjuri Country, engage with local community, and participate in public programming.



For 2021 our small core team remained unchanged and expanded to welcome many sub-contracted staff to help us deliver our 2021 program.





FINANCE

2021 saw Murray Arts Income take another significant leap, in 2018 & 2019 our revenue averaged \$370,000 per annum, in 2020 jumped to \$456,000 and 2021 \$608,000. These increases are due to COVID-19 stimulus funds, an increase in the amount of funds we are called upon to Auspice and a core-funding boost from Create NSW. The many programs, initiatives, support, and outcomes we delivered in 2021 was far too much for our small core team to handle and subsequently we brought on a tribe of local support staff to help. Burraja Gallery's 12month Pop-Up at 560 Olive Street Albury, put considerable strain on Murray Arts. The cost of Albury CBD rent, the extra staff needed to maintain opening hours and the challenges of 2021 resulted in us recording a \$18,000 deficit for 2021. But after years of consistently recording surplus' we are going strong, maintaining healthy reserves and continuing to investigate opportunities to champion Burraja Gallery with a more sustainable model.
