

2024 came with its own unique challenges, with our core funding partner Create NSW announcing the new Arts and Cultural Funding Program (ACFP). The program has ended the long-standing agreement with the Regional Arts Network which saw all 15 NSW Regional Arts Development Organisations including Murray Arts equally funded and instead enabled us to apply for increased competitive funding.

We took this opportunity to examine the core services and value we have provided to our community over our 30-year history and submitted a very competitive and exciting plan for continued multi-year funding.

Limelight 3.0 was a huge success welcoming 4000+ people across three nights and three locations. A big thank you goes to everyone who helped deliver this project both by creating original art installations and supporting the running of the event.

We asked for expressions of interest for the Burraja Independence Working Party and spent the year collaborating and being guided by those First Nations artists who came forward with a passion to establish an independent First Nations-led gallery.

Our involvement in the NSW Regional Arts Network (RAN) and Regional Arts NSW (RANSW) enabled us to offer opportunities to emerging and professional creatives through HORIZONS Youth Mentorship, Work of Art Regional Women's Professional Development and Regional Cultural Tourism Project.

Finally, a huge thank you to my team, Julien Bonnel, Executive Support & Grants Officer, Mark-John Martyn, First Nations Creative Development Officer, and Glennys Briggs, Burraja Gallery Outreach Coordinator who always give 110% not only to Murray Arts but to their creative communities. We look forward to continuing to be on the ground offering support, connections and opportunities for this region's unique creatives.

Supporting Creative Industries

Support

Advocate

Through these strategic relationships, we work to strengthen the support structures surrounding the creative industries, ensuring policies and funding opportunities align with the real needs of the sector. The Regional Arts Network (RAN) commissioned a research report in 2024 on Cultural Tourism in regional NSW, undertaken by Patternmakers and funded through Create NSW.

Horizons Creatives Industries Career Launchpad

Mentoring program **supporting 75 young people** aged 16–27 across regional NSW in developing creative industry careers, delivered with Regional Arts Network and culminating in a co-designed showcase.

Regional Arts NSW professional development project funded by Women NSW and **featuring 70 regional female artists** chosen from the Regional Arts Network.

First Nations Creative Development

Murray Arts is committed to supporting First Nations Creative Development.

We established the Aboriginal Artist Network (AAN) which supports artists in each stage of their artistic journey, from emerging to established, as well as forging connections through art to our greater community.





Burraja Gallery

Launched in July 2016, Burraja Gallery is the only dedicated First Nations Art Gallery in the region. The Gallery advocates for all First Nations artists who live, work or connect to our region, and provides opportunities for dialogue and connection between the wider community and the First Nations community.

In 2024, the Burraja Gallery Independence Project began along with establishing a working party of First Nations artists who have been collaborating on transitioning Burraja to a First Nations-led model and once again opening a gallery space on the Border in 2025.

Kinder Kulture

Interactive workshops led by local First Nations creatives, engaging 500+ pre-school aged children across 5 kindergartens and early learning centres. Creatives share their practice in fun and interactive ways across music, visual arts, drama and storytelling to celebrate Aboriginal arts and culture.

Yidaki Workshop

Digeridoo making workshop presented by Alan & Phil Murray and supported by Albury City Council.

Unique Identities

Murray Arts First Nations Creative Development Officer took part in the Unique Identities program delivered by Aboriginal Regional Arts Alliance. The NSW statewide professional development initiative for Aboriginal artists and arts workers from regional NSW took place over one year and saw participants gain greater knowledge and connection to their own traditional Country and people.

Keep the Fire Burning, Naidoc Week

Murray Arts attended the Albury Wodonga NAIDOC Committee event on Gateway Island to display Burraja Gallery artworks and merchandise and gather feedback from the community about the Independence Project.

In April 2024, Murray Arts presented Limelight 3.0, a free, family-friendly art trail investigating the relationship between art, science, and light.



UNLOCKED Professional Development Microgrant Program

The UNLOCKED professional development program was an initiative developed as a response to the massive disruption that COVID-19 caused across the creative sector. Designed to support professional development of individual independent creatives in the Murray Arts footprint, UNLOCKED continues to attract a record number of applicants and funded 20 grants of \$1,500 in 2024.

GreenHouse Residency Workshop Program

GreenHouse National Artist Residency is an initiative of HotHouse Theatre and is open to performing artists from across Australia.

Each residency includes a requirement of the artist(s) to deliver a community workshop that shares their unique artistic skill or experience with our community. These workshops are produced by Murray Arts in partnership with HotHouse Theatre and AlburyCity Cultural Activation team.

Country Arts Support Program (CASP)

CASP is a NSW Government grass roots funding program, in its 37th year, aimed at supporting a creative and vibrant regional NSW art scene. Murray Arts is now in its third year of solely administrating the program and have achieved an extremely efficient turn around, from close of submissions to informing successful applicants.

Financial

Performance

Murray Arts total revenue for 2024 was \$524,942. We continue to draw income from a variety of sources including multi-year agreements with Create NSW and our LGA partners, one-off grant income from federal, state and local sources.

Auspicing grants on behalf of individuals, collectives and groups continues to be a valued and accessed service of Murray Arts, plus Burraja Gallery and programs such as Kinder Kulture, creative workshops and Creatives Directory aid towards our earned income.

Overall, Murray Arts is in a healthy financial position with our reserves enabling the organisation to invest in updating infrastructure. This year we recorded a deficit of \$28,279 redeveloping our website, digital events guide and Creatives Directory.




